We also gave a talk to Langdon Hills over 60's club on the Plotland Era.



Day in History

25 January 1969 – On this day in 1969, as the Vietnam War continued in Indochina, peace talks began in Paris which included a demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam. The national Liberation Front and the North Vietnamese delegations refused the American proposals, condemning U.S. "aggression" in the region. The war continued until 1973.

26 January 1980 - On this day, one month after the Soviet Union invaded Afghanistan, the U.S. Olympic Committee voted to ask the International Olympic Committee to cancel or move the upcoming games in Moscow. The Committee and Soviets ignored U.S. Olympic Committee. So, the games went ahead with U.S voting to boycott the games.

27 January 1302 – Dante Alighieri, a poet and politician in Florence, was exiled from the city for his political activities on this day. At the time, Dante was one of six priors who governed Florence. As an influential official, Dante had earlier banished several of his political rivals, which led to his own ouster from the city. As he wandered the countryside with his family, Dante wrote *The Divine Comedy*, a poem about the poet's journey through Hell, Purgatory, and Paradise. Dante wrote his masterpiece in sections from 1308 until his death in 1321. Many consider the poem one of the greatest works in literature.

The following is the most famous line in the poem:

"Before me things create were none, save things Eternal, and eternal I endure. All hope abandon ye who enter here."

Local Archaeology

Wickford, Land at Shot Farm (TQ 76940 93640; WKDSf20)

A trial-trench evaluation was carried out as part of pre-application works for a proposed residential develop. A preceding geophysical survey identified a number of anomalies of probable archaeological origin. These included part of a well-defined rectangular enclosure, four linear anomalies corresponding to former field boundaries shown on historic mapping, and a linear response that corresponded with the suggested route of a Second World War defensive line known as the Eastern GHQ Stop line.

Twenty-four evaluation trenches were excavated, mostly targeting geophysical anomalies. Archaeological features were recorded in fifteen trenches, demonstrating a good correlation with the geophysical survey results.

Prehistoric remains consisted of a single large pit, or intercutting pit cluster, and a ditch of probable Late Bronze Age date. Residual prehistoric pottery found in later features across the site suggest that prehistoric activity was more extensive.

The majority of recorded archaeological remains comprised ditches defining parts of an Early Roman field system that may have endured into the 3rd century. This system included a rectilinear ditched enclosure that seems to have been the focus of deposition of domestic occupation debris and might have been the site of a rural settlement farmstead.

Former field boundary ditches of 19th/20th-century date corresponded to the geophysical survey results and the evidence of historic mapping.

Th Eastern GHQ Stop line, understood to have extended down the western side of the site, was recorded as a ditch. Ground level across the north end of the site was found to have been raised by approximately 0.8m in modern times, presumably to counter flooding from the adjacent River Crouch.

History Snippets

Who Fired the first shots of World War 1?

It could be argued that the first shots were by Gavrilo Princip assassin of Archduke Franz Ferdinand. But in terms of actual combat after war was declared, there are a couple of lesser-known names that may have pulled the trigger first.

Alhaji Grunshi, from Ghana, served the British in the Gold Coast Regiment when he was sent on Patrol in the German colony of Togoland (Togo today). On either 7 or 12 August 1914, he fired on a small group of German-led police.

The Western Front had to wait until 22 August before hearing its first shot – from a gun of a 20year-old British private named Ernest Edward Thomas. In the resulting skirmish, there were no human casualties, although one horse did die.

Buildings of History Interest that are disappearing

Pitsea Cinema



Pitsea Cinema is in the process of being demolished. It was first named 'The Broadway Kinema' (not a spelling mistake) and opened its first doors on the 28 March 1930 by the chairman of the Pitsea Parish Council – Mr William Pedlar and the first film shown on this date was 'White Shadows in the South Seas' staring Monte Blue and Raquel Torres.

Its name was later changed to – 'The Century Cinema'- It eventually closed in 1970 and became a bingo club. The last film to be shown was 'Born Free' staring Virginia McKenna and Bill Travers. The bingo club eventually closed on 27th July 2009 and has stayed empty and deteriorating ever since.

Cornerstone

Another of our old bungalows that has disappeared into the mist of history. The bungalow is "Cornerstone" which was situated on the corner of the High Road and Alexandra Road, Langdon Hills.

So, what was so special about this particular bungalow? Well in 1947/48 Waldemar Duemke a German prisoner from the OW Camp 266 situated in Dry Street; Langdon Hill opened it up as a church – "The New Apostolic Church" – a non-conformist church. The room where the services were held was in initially two rooms converted into one and at the far end of the room a small platform was built for the alter. It was not long before he had a thriving choir from the local community.

We can only assume that he named the bungalow "Cornerstone" after the famous by Edward Mote who published it in 1837. The following is the chorus:

"Christ alone, Cornerstone Weak made strong in the Saviour's love Through the storm, He is Lord Lord of all"



Waldemar moved on after a couple of years with his family to another church and the church reverted to a bungalow. It has now been demolished and flats are slowly replacing it. Jus another bit of our local history disappearing.
